Progress towards the EECRP



November 4, 2024, planned start of the school year 2024-25

General Education: The Directorate General of Education identified **350 public schools** that are ready to be used for the start of the scholastic year, and **169 private schools** that will host public school students. Public schools will open on a **shift basis**, each shift will be 3 days a week for 7 periods a day, providing a total of 21 periods of school for each group of students per week. Distribution of students and teachers is ongoing.

To date, **1,851** e-lessons have been migrated to MADRISTI platform.

<u>Technical and Vocational Education</u>: Classes will resume in <u>2 modalities</u>: <u>In person</u>—at TVET centers in non-affected areas and not repurposed as shelters

Distance Learning—at TVET centers that are in affected areas or are being repurposed as shelters

Displaced students may opt for in person learning at a TVET center located near their current residence. ($Decision\ 46/m/2024$)

Student <u>registration</u> will continue until November 21, 2024

All classes will follow **asynchronous** online learning for the first 2 weeks. **Student registration will continue until November 20, 2024**.

International Conference in Paris
24 October 2024
Minister Abbas El Halabi
Statement Summary

Minister El-Halabi participated in the international conference called by the French President Emmanuel Macron for Lebanon, as a member of the official Lebanese delegation led by Prime Minister Najib Mikati. At the request of Prime Minister Mikati, Minister El-Halabi was assigned the responsibility of ensuring that Lebanese children do not miss another school year, especially students in terminal classes. He presented a copy of MEHE's multisectoral EECRP to President Macron.

Minister El-Halabi highlighted the severe impact of the aggression on Lebanon's education sector, with extensive displacement of students and teachers, and the large number of educational institutions affected. He outlined the strategic goals of the EECRP identified to ensure inclusive and quality education, provide psychological and social support, empower teachers, and build a resilient educational system.

International aid remains insufficient.
